## 6 in Car Report Ball of Light Circled House, Followed Auto

HOT SPRINGS, Ark., April 23 to Six workmen, who had gathered late last night at a rural home near here to ride to work, told a reporter they watched a mysterious, gleaming ball hover over the house for 20 minutes.

One of the men, Les Reatherford, said the ball once dived toward him, and that he had to duck to avoid being hit.

"If I hadn't ducked it would have hit me sure," said Reatherford.

The men, all employes of a Reynolds' Metal Co., aluminum plant, said the y met nightly at the house near the town of Pearcy to ride to work together.

They described the white ball of light as about 10 feet in diameter. They said it circled the house slowly, stopping for a moment at irregular intervals.

One of the witnesses said the ball followed the men when they left in a station wagon, and drove toward Pearcy.

"We tried to put a spotlight on it," said one of the men, "but every time it would dodge the beam."

The men agreed that the ball suddenly disappeared as they reached Pearcy.

story I wouldn't have believed them. But I saw it as did the confirmed Weatherford's story.

Tom Sheets added: "If anyone else had told me this other fellows. And I'll tell you one thing, I never saw anything like it in my life. I don't know whether it was a flying saucer, but it surely was something mysterious. And we weren't just seeing things."

The other two men nodded agreement

In addition to Weatherford and the three in the station wagon, others who saw the object were Dayton Henderson and John Vaughn.

Asked whether he felt any heat from the object when it narrowly missed him, Weatherford replied:

"No, and I didn't hear any-thing, either."

The men said they watched the

ball for about 20 minutes as it con-

tinued its gyrations.
Then, they all got in the station wagon and headed down the old Amity road towards Pearcy.

Tom Sheets said the ghost-like ball moved with them as they drove down the highway, keeping about 50 feet in the air and about 200 feet off the highway.

The men said the object kept abreast of them until the car ap-proached Pearcy. Then, they said,

it just disappeared.
"We tried to throw the car
spotlight on the thing," Weatherford said, "But everytime we pointed the light at the ball, it would elther go up or down to get out of the beam. We just couldn't get the ball in the light.

"I know a lot of people will think we are crazy," Tom Sheets said. "But we all saw this thing and felt it should be reported."
